A Human Services Degree prepares graduates as field generalists, able to adapt skills and interventions to a variety of populations in different service settings.

- The goal of human services work is to enhance client quality of life.
- Practitioners provide client services as part of a care team that may include nursing, psychology, physical therapy or social work professionals.
- Work functions include: needs assessment, treatment plan support, benefit eligibility determination, assistance with daily living skills, coordination of support services, provision of emotional support, and family communications.
- Work locations include: nonprofit agencies, residential treatment facilities, correctional facilities, group homes, or halfway houses.
